Sometime in 2018, John Hagan, then among the leadership of Post 5 American Legion, discussed with me the idea for a weekly Veterans' Coffee Group at The Brattleboro Legion. He proposed that the Legion would provide the space and coffee, and that we could chip in to provide the donuts. We decided to give it a try, and starting with the two of us and word of mouth, our group over several months first outgrew a small meeting room, then a larger dining room and finally settled in at the Legion's largest meeting space to accommodate a weekly crowd of between 30 and 40 veterans.

We meet at 9am every Tuesday at the Legion for one hour. We do everything very democratically, agreeing on who outside of our group can be invited to speak at our gathering and how to organize the actual meeting. We have no set agenda for each meeting, and after our Pledge of Allegiance, we open the floor to announcements and see where the discussion goes from there. That is one of the interesting and fun aspects of the weekly meeting - one never knows what the topic or topics of the day will be. There is no pressure for anyone to speak at the meeting, and many are happy to listen to the discussion without speaking. It is a tribute to the respect that each veteran has for his peers that the conversation remains civil no matter how much one may disagree with another's opinion. It is clear that this weekly gathering is enjoyable for the participants, as much information is shared, and many smiles are observed among the participants.

For many veterans, this gathering has become a weekly destination, and I think, has helped to reduce the inevitable isolation, which is so often the case in rural areas, particularly during the winter months. We are always happy to welcome new veterans and are particularly happy during those meetings when women veterans are in attendance.

For the working age veterans in the tri-state area whose schedule does not allow them to come to the Tuesday morning meeting, there is a monthly Veterans' Pizza Night at 7pm at the Legion on the last Thursday of each month. All veterans and their families are welcome.

The PACT Act

What's the PACT Act and how will it affect my VA benefits and care?

The PACT Act is perhaps the largest health care and benefit expansion in VA history. The full name of the law is The Sergeant First Class (SFC) Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act.

The PACT Act will bring these changes:

- Expands and extends eligibility for VA health care for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War, and post-9/11 eras
- Adds 20+ more presumptive conditions for burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic exposures
- Adds more presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation
- Requires VA to provide a toxic exposure screening to every Veteran enrolled in VA health care
- Helps us improve research, staff education, and treatment related to toxic exposures

If you're a Veteran or survivor, you can file claims now to apply for PACT Act-related benefits.

Reader's Roost Book of the Month!

Our Book of the Month is the New York Times Bestseller, "About Face, the Odyssey of an American Warrior". *About Face* is a memoir by Colonel David Hackworth, detailing his experiences in the U.S. Army over a career that spanned several decades. The book covers his time in combat, starting with his service in the Korean War, through his role in the Vietnam War, and up until his departure from the miltary in the 1970s. Hackworth privides a candid and often critical account of military leadership, the bureaucracy of the Armed Forces, and the challenges soldiers face during wartime. The book highlights hackworth's evolution from a young, idealistic officer to a seasoned, outspoken critic of military inefficiency and corruption. *About Face* is both a personal story and a critique of the military establishment, offering insights into the realities of warfare and the complexities of command. Would you believe he enlisted in the Army at the age of 15?
